# **Important Notice Regarding Cache Sizes**

For ACS Version 8.7, minimum cache size requirements are 128 MB in unmirrored configurations, and 256 MB in mirrored configurations, per cache module.

The cache size requirements for running ACS Version 8.7S remain at 512 MB.

# **Identifying ACS Revision Level**

The ACS release package you received should include a PCMCIA program card containing the new ACS software. Included in this section are instructions for determining the ACS version running on your RAID Array.

Once ACS is installed, you can identify the specific version of ACS by typing the following command at the CLI prompt:

HSG80> SHOW THIS CONTROLLER

The resulting display lists the software revision level as one of the following:

V87G

V87F

V87S

If the ACS version is not Version 8.7 or a subsequently patched version of ACS Version 8.7, contact your support provider for instructions on how to obtain the updated version.

If the ACS version is Version 8.7S, you need additional layered application software beyond this Solution Software Kit to take advantage of the added functionality of these versions. See "Layered Software Applications", page 26, for additional information on compatible layered application software.

ACS Version 8.7 is fully compatible with Version 8.7A Solution Software. In addition, Version 8.7A Solution Software is backward compatible with ACS Version 8.6, which benefits the upgrade process across your SAN.

# **Patching ACS**

Each ACS patch builds on the current version of ACS and all previously installed patches. ACS patches must be installed in order, from lowest to highest, when multiple patches are installed. ACS patches are available for download from the following *StorageWorks* website:

ACS patch downloads come packaged with the instructions and scripts needed to apply the patch. See the *HSG80 Array Controller ACS Version 8.7 Maintenance and Service Guide* for further information on patching ACS.

# **ACS Patch Memory**

Any installed ACS Version 8.6 (or lower) patches should be removed after an ACS Version 8.7 installation since they are no longer applicable. This frees up HSG80 patch memory for future ACS patches.

To check or remove ACS patches, run the Code Load and Code Patch utility by typing the following command:

HSG80> RUN CLCP

### **New Features**

This section briefly describes new features and changes that are supported by the Version 8.7A release of the Solution Software together with the array controller running ACS Version 8.7.

### **New Features for 8.7A**

The following are major enhancements included in the 8.7A release of the Solution Software Kit.

- **Blade Servers**—Solution Software Kits now support ProLiant Blade Servers BL20p and BL40p.
- Added support for ProLiant Essentials Rapid Deployment Pack which provides automated server deployment and redeployment via a central console using imaging and scripting technologies for ProLiant servers. The deployment console provides simple drag-and-drop functionality for deployment events. The Solution Software Kit CD-ROM contains software components, drivers, and utilities that are located in the \rdp/rdp directory. See readme.txt on the CD-ROM for a more detailed description of Rapid Deployment Pack, installation instructions, and restrictions. - Rapid Deployment Pack Procedures—Two new Rapid Deployment Pack
  procedures were added for the installation of Fibre Channel Utilities and the
  qla2x00 driver RPM. The procedures are listed under "Host Operating System
  Notes", page 33.
  - Fibre Channel Utilities—The RPM fibreutils-1.0.0-5.i386.rpm contains assorted utilities that complement the qla2x00 driver package. The fibreutils package contains two major utilities: hp\_fccfg.sh and probe-luns. The hp\_fccfg.sh script allows you to recompile the driver if needed and change the default queue depth for disk devices attached to a qla2200 series or qla2300 series fibre channel adapter. Probe-luns solves the problem of non-consecutive LUNs.
  - QLA2x00 Driver RPM—The RPM qla2x00-6.0.2-5.Redhat-AS-2-1.i386.rpm contains the adapter driver for the HP supported fibre channel adapters on Red Hat Advanced Server 2.1. The RPM contains the driver source code, precompiled modules for the base kernel of Red Hat Advanced Server 2.1, and system startup scripts.

#### ACS Feature Enhancements

The following major enhancements are included in the ACS Version 8.7 release:

- Host Connection Table Locking—Host table lock and unlock commands were added to control the connection table in NVRAM. When the table is locked, the host login request is rejected (unless the connection is already in the table), and the request is stored internally on a rejected hosts table.
- Selective Management Presentation—Selective Management Presentation extends the use of Selective Storage Presentation by providing control over which SAN Management Agent systems (if any) can perform management operations.
- **VENDOR\_ID Field**—ACS now provides a VENDOR\_ID field at the bottom of the **Extended information** area, returned by the SHOW THIS FULL OF SHOW OTHER FULL commands.
- Linked WWIDs for Snap and Clone Units—To better manage snap and clone unit creation, a linked WWID scheme was implemented. It keeps the WWIDs of these units constant each time they are created. The linked WWID scheme reduces the number of system data records needed to track unit WWIDs, and enhances the stability of administrative scripts used in unit creation.
- SMART Error Drive Eject—In prior versions of ACS, SMART error
  notifications received from a device were treated as soft (recovered) errors. The
  notification was passed to the host and operations continued. ACS now provides a
  CLI switch (SMART error eject state) that offers an alternative to this behavior.
  - With the new switch enabled, drives in a normalized and redundant set that report a SMART error are removed from that set. SMART errors reported by drives in a non-redundant or non-normal set continue to be treated as recovered errors. If the switch is disabled, all SMART errors are treated as recovered errors.
- Error Threshold for Drives—ACS now provides the ability to set limits for drive errors. Once the limit is reached, the questionable drive is removed from any redundant set it is a member of and put into the failed set. Errors counted are medium and recovered errors. Hardware errors are not included in this count since the drive fails immediately when a hardware error is encountered.

# **Modular Array Solutions**

The modular solution consists of the array controller (single or dual configurations) installed in a Model 2200 Ultra SCSI controller enclosure, and the drives installed in either a Model 4314 disk enclosure or a Model 4354 disk enclosure. The modular solutions must be mounted in RETMA cabinets. The *StorageWorks* RETMA cabinets are available in heights of 42U, 41U, 36U, and 22U. The Model 2200 Ultra SCSI controller enclosure is 4U. The Model 4314 disk enclosure and the Model 4354 disk enclosure are both 3U. This combination allows for several cabinet configurations.

**NOTE:** If you wish to use a controller from an existing RA8000 or ESA12000 storage system, the Cache Bulkhead upgrade for installation of the controller in the Model 2200 is required.

- For information about how to install the array controller in a Model 2200 Ultra SCSI controller enclosure, see the *Model 2100 and 2200 Ultra SCSI Controller Enclosures User Guide*.
- For information about how to install drives in either a Model 4314 disk enclosure or a Model 4354 disk enclosure, see the *Model 4300 Family Ultra3 LVD Disk Enclosures User Guide*.
- For information about modular solution configurations and restrictions, see the *Modular Array Cabinet Restrictions* user document.

### **Disk Enclosures**

The array controller firmware addresses up to 14 disks per SCSI bus. The maximum number of disks supported by an array controller (single or cooperating pair) is 84. The disk enclosures can be configured for single bus or for dual bus operation.

**NOTE:** The 43xx disk enclosures do not allow daisy chaining between shelves.

# **Ordering Modular Storage Systems**

The Modular Array/Enterprise Modular Array storage systems can be ordered in one of the following three ways:

  - EMA12000 S14: One Model 2200 controller enclosure and six single bus Model 4314 disk enclosures in a 36U Modular Storage Cabinet
  - EMA12000 Blue: One Model 2200 controller enclosure and three dual bus Model 4354 disk enclosures in a 41U Modular Storage Cabinet
  - EMA16000 S14: Two Model 2200 controller enclosures and twelve single bus 4314 disk enclosures in a 41U Modular Storage Cabinet

This Fibre Channel Solution Software Kit supports the Fibre Channel switches and firmware versions listed in Table 5.

**IMPORTANT:** StorageWorks recommends that you do not mix switch firmware versions in your SAN. It is considered best practice to uniformly upgrade all switches in the SAN.

**NOTE:** Blade server ProLiant BL20p is shipped with an in-built HBA driver version 6.0.2, Firmware Version 1.33.

#### Notes:

Linux kernel Version 2.4 is the minimum required for array controllers using ACS Version 8.7 software.

#### **Driver Installation**

The driver required for successful operation of the array controller with Linux is included in the HPqla2x00-v6.0.2.rpm RPM file. Through executing the install\_stgwks script in the <cdrom mount point>/agents directory on the Solution Software CD-ROM, you install the driver module and the driver source. The driver sources are installed into the /var/local/HPqla2x00 directory.

### **Host Adapter BIOS Settings**

A key aspect of proper operation of the *StorageWorks* QLA2x00 HBA with the array controller is properly setting up the HBA BIOS.

StorageWorks QLA2x00 Fibre Channel HBA BIOS provides a means of controlling HBA operation. The HBA BIOS is configured through the FAST!UTIL utility, which is invoked by pressing **<ALT-Q>** during QLA2x00 BIOS initialization.

There is no difference between the settings suggested for Alpha systems and Intel systems. Alpha systems use an Intel machine to set the FAST!UTIL settings, as there is no program available to set the NVRAM settings on Alpha. While the *StorageWorks* QLA2x00 HBA is a 64-bit PCI card, testing on a standard Compaq DeskPro EN has shown it will fit in a 32-bit slot if installed carefully.

Table 7 and Table 8 describe the correct settings to use for operating the HBA with the array controller in FC-SW Mode.

1. This is the maximum number of LUNs the HBA will see per controller. You can safely modify this to a lower number to correspond with the number of units you make on your storage system. A higher number will not adversely impact your operation, and it will give you room to add more units although there is a maximum number of LUNs. See the documentation that came with your storage system. For example: A setting of 64 will let you see units D1-D63 on port 1 and D101-163 on port 2.

**NOTE:** Settings in the Suggested Value column that are marked with an asterisk (\*) are non-default settings.

The following list provides additional detail on the Host Adapter BIOS Settings described in Table 7 through Table 10 above:

- **Host Adapter BIOS**—When this setting is disabled, the ROM BIOS on the QLA2x00 board is not loaded into memory. For operation with the array controller, this setting should be *Disabled*.
- **Frame Size**—This setting specifies the maximum frame length supported by the QLA2x00 board. For best operation with the array controller, this option should be set to 2048.
- **Loop Reset Delay**—After resetting the loop, the firmware refrains from initiating any loop activity for the number of seconds specified in this setting. The default value of 5 seconds works well with the controller, allowing sufficient time for the loop to stabilize after a reset.
- **Adapter Hard Loop ID**—This setting forces the adapter to use the Target ID specified in the Hard Loop ID setting. This setting should be *Enabled*.
- Hard Loop ID—The adapter will attempt to use the value in this setting if the Adapter Hard Loop ID is enabled. The correct setting for usage with the array controller is 125 for the first HBA in the loop, and 124, 123, and 122 for HBA number 2 through 4. See the accompanying HSG80 ACS Solution Software Version 8.7 Installation and Configuration Guide, for more information on the mapping of SCSI Target IDs to Arbitrated Loop Physical Addresses (AL\_PAs).

The following list provides additional detail on the Advanced Host Adapter BIOS Settings described in Table 7 and Table 9 above:

- **Execution Throttle**—This setting specifies the maximum number of commands executing on any one port. When a port's execution throttle value is reached, no new commands are executed until the current command finishes execution. The default value of 16 has been shown to work well with the array controller.
- **Fast Command Posting**—This setting decreases command execution time by minimizing the number of interrupts. This setting should be *Enabled*.
- > 4 Gbyte Addressing—Enable this setting if your system has more than 4 GB of physical memory.
- **LUNs per Target ID**—This setting specifies the number of LUNs per Target ID, which will be presented by the QLA2x00. This setting is critical for mapping all the LUNs that are presented by the array controller. When using both ports, the array controller presents up to 100 LUNs per Target ID and 2 Target IDs. Under normal circumstances, a setting of *16* is sufficient; this provides support for using Unit Numbers D1-D63 on port 1, and Unit Numbers D101-D163 on port 2.

- **Enable LIP Reset**—This setting determines the type of loop initialization process (LIP) reset that is used when the operating system initiates a SCSI bus reset. When set to *Yes*, the driver initiates a global LIP reset to clear target device reservations. When set to *No*, the driver initiates a global LIP reset with full login. This option should be set to *Yes*.
- **Enable LIP Full Login**—This setting instructs the ISP2100 chip to re-login all ports after any LIP. This should be set to *Yes*.
- **Enable Target Reset**—This setting instructs the driver to issue a Target Reset to all devices on the loop when a SCSI Bus Reset command is issued. This should be set to *Yes*.
- **Login Retry Count**—This setting specifies the number of times the software tries to log in to a device port before issuing a port down status. This should be set to 8 retries.
- **Port Down Retry Count**—This setting specifies the number of times the software retries a command to a port returning "port down" status prior to aborting the command. This should be set to 8 retries.
- **Drivers Load RISC Code**—When enabled, the HBA accepts the RISC firmware from the driver. For the *qla2x00* driver, set this option to *Yes*.
- **Enable Database Updates**—This setting allows the software to save the loop configuration information in Flash Memory when the system powers down. This can be left at *No*.
- **IOCB Allocation**—This setting specifies the maximum number of I/O Control Buffers allocated from the firmware's buffer pool for any one port. This setting is also used by the *qla2x00* driver to set the Tagged Command Queue depth for each LUN. This setting should be set to 8 buffers.
  - **IMPORTANT:** Setting this value too high may have adverse effects on system performance with a large number of LUNs.
- Extended Error Logging—This setting provides additional error and debug information to the operating system. This value can be left at *Disabled*, unless serious problems are occurring on your system.

# **StorageWorks Command Console**

SWCC Version 2.5 is included in this release. Version 2.5 is used to identify the SWCC suite of components.

SWCC provides a graphical user interface that can be used to configure and monitor your storage system. Use of SWCC is highly recommended, but not required. The SWCC Agent is installed as part of the Solution Software Kit.

For more information on SWCC installation, see the *HSG80 ACS Solution Software Version 8.7 Installation and Configuration Guide*. For more information on SWCC Client operation, see the *Command Console Version 2.5 User Guide* and the *Command Console Version 2.5 Release Notes*.

### **SWCC Scalability**

- The SWCC Client can monitor up to 128 host systems, each with up to 32 storage systems, for a maximum of 4096 concurrent storage connections and a total of 2.65 PB of storage.
- One Agent can support up to 32 Clients.

### **Multiple Agents**

This Solution Software Kit contains an SWCC Agent that supports controller locking during CLI command execution, which allows support for multiple Agents. This locking feature is required in order to use the Management Appliance in addition to the host-based SWCC Agent. However, it is not recommended or required to use multiple Agents for any other purpose.

**NOTE:** SWCC Agent Version 2.3.2, Build 79 or higher supports the locking feature. This release of Solution Software exceeds this requirement.

### **Multiple Management Sessions**

Though multiple clients can be used to monitor your storage system, *StorageWorks* recommends that only one instance of storage system management be active at a time. The client does allow for multiple management sessions, but there are no ownership rights given to any particular session. Without a highly coordinated effort, multiple management sessions can undermine the integrity of system maintenance. This same principle applies to multiple management sessions initiated through the Management Appliance as well.

In cases where ACS functional builds other than Version 8.7F are required, ensure that all necessary components for those configurations are at the proper level prior to upgrading your ACS code.

# **ACS Feature Support**

The following sections provide details for specific ACS features.

### **Maximum Host Connections**

The maximum number of host connections is 96 for the table of known connections. A connection is unique to the node WWN, port WWN, and controller port. This table is maintained in the NVRAM of the controller. If the table contains 96 entries, new connections cannot be added unless unused entries are deleted. Otherwise, a host attempting FC login is rejected from becoming a connection into the connection table, but not necessarily from the fabric.

# **Disk Partitioning**

ACS allows partitioning of disk drives or storagesets for improved device management. A partition appears to the operating system as a single virtual disk. Up to eight partitions may be created per storageset or disk drive. Disk partitioning is supported under all failover modes supported by your operating system.

### **SNAPSHOT**

ACS with SNAPSHOT capability provides a quick and efficient way to make a point-in-time copy of a storage container's data. SNAPSHOT freezes a map of the container's data, which can be separated and used for backup or testing and manipulation without having an impact on the original data. After the SNAPSHOT, the original data can continue to be updated and utilized while the SNAPSHOT copy remains unchanged.

When the need for the duplicate copy of data has ended, a new snap of a different storage container can be made and the process repeated. SNAPSHOT eliminates much of the overhead associated with mirroring and cloning since the SNAPSHOT is dissolved without having to re-merge the data.

SNAPSHOT is enabled when the following CLI command is entered:

HSG80> ADD SNAPSHOT\_UNITS

See the *HSG80 Array Controller ACS Version 8.7 CLI Reference Guide* for additional syntax details.

The SNAPSHOT unit can be presented to the host. The SNAPSHOT unit remains until it is deleted.

**NOTE:** SNAPSHOT functionality requires ACS Version 8.7S.

**IMPORTANT:** ACS SNAPSHOT capability requires 512 MB of cache memory.

# **Dynamic Volume Expansion**

Dynamic Volume Expansion creates a specialized volume called a concatset (short for concatenation set) from a storageset that was given a unit number. Another storageset can then be added to the concatset by using the SET CONCATSET command. See the HSG80 Array Controller ACS Version 8.7 CLI Reference Guide for syntax details.

### **Dynamic Disks**

The use of SNAPSHOTs and SNAPCLONEs in Compaq SANs is not supported in a Windows 2000 environment if the SNAPSHOT or SNAPCLONE is presented to the same Windows 2000 host as the LUN from which the SNAPSHOT or SNAPCLONE was created. SNAPSHOTs and SNAPCLONEs are features of the HSG80 and HSV110 controller based Compaq Storage systems. All Dynamic disks on a system have information in their metadata about the other dynamic disks that exist on the system. When Windows is presented with 2 dynamic disks that have the same information on them, it does not have code to resolve the conflict.

# **Configuration Rules**

The following list defines maximum configuration rules for the controller:

- 128 visible LUNs/200 assignable unit numbers
  - In SCSI-3 mode, if the CCL is enabled, the result is 126 visible LUNs and two CCLs.
- 1.024 TB storageset size
- 96 host connections
- 84 physical devices
- 20 RAID 3/5 storagesets
- 30 RAID 3/5 and RAID 1 storagesets (see Note)
- 45 RAID 3/5, RAID 1, and RAID 0 storagesets (see Note)

**NOTE:** For the previous two storageset configurations, this is a combined maximum, limited to no more than 20 RAID 3/5 storagesets.

- 8 partitions of a storageset or individual disk
- 6 physical devices per RAID 1 storageset (mirrorset)
- 14 physical devices per RAID 3/5 storageset (RAIDset)
- 24 physical devices per RAID 0 storageset (stripeset)
- 45 physical devices per RAID 0+1 storageset (striped mirrorset)

# **Operating Constraints**

This section describes the operating constraints for ACS Version 8.7. An operating constraint is a limitation placed on the operation of the controller. Other constraints on host adapters or other system components may also apply. Keep these constraints in mind to avoid problems and to help achieve the maximum performance from your controller. See the documentation that came with your host server for more details.

# **External Cache Battery**

*StorageWorks* recommends that you replace the External Cache Battery (ECB) every two years to prevent battery failure.

If you are shutting down your controller for longer than one day, complete the additional steps in "Shutting Down the Subsystem" in the *HSG80 Array Controller ACS Version 8.7 Maintenance and Service Guide*. This prevents the ECB from discharging during planned power outages.

### **Dual External Cache Battery Failures**

The array controller cache policy provides for proper handling of a single ECB failure as described in the *HSG80 Array Controller ACS Version 8.7 Troubleshooting Reference Guide*. For dual ECB failures, it states that no failover occurs. For this release, if a dual ECB failure is detected, both controllers are restarted.

# **Command Console LUN Usage**

In order to avoid access conflicts between the *sg* and *sd* drivers, the Access Device used for SWCC Agent communication *must not* be an *sd* device. Please ensure that the sg device used does not have an *sd* device mapped to the same LUN. The best way to verify this is to use *scsi\_info* on the *sg* device to verify that its Target ID/LUN combination has a Logical Unit Number value of 0 (zero). With the array controller operating in SCSI-3 mode, the CCLs are always mapped to Logical Unit Number 0.

# Using FRUTIL to Insert a New Controller

When using FRUTIL to insert a new controller in a dual-redundant controller configuration, you see a new set of instructions after the new controller was inserted:

If the other controller did not restart, follow these steps:

- 1. Press and hold the **Reset** button on the other controller.
- 2. Remove and re-insert the program card for the other controller.
- 3. Release the **Reset** button.

**NOTE:** Whenever you are running FRUTIL you must quiesce all I/O.

# **Saving Your Configuration**

When enabled, the SAVE\_CONFIGURATION function allows you to do the following (supported on single controller configurations only):

• Save a configuration to a disk or storageset. The configuration may be retrieved later and downloaded onto a replacement controller.

• Retain code patches to the ACS software.

# Saving a Configuration to Previously Initialized Storagesets

If any storageset within the configuration was previously initialized with the INITIALIZE container-name SAVE\_CONFIGURATION command to save your configuration to disk, it is not necessary to reconfigure your devices with a new controller. SAVE\_CONFIGURATION also retains code patch information to the software. This option is supported on single controller configurations only.

ACS Version 8.7 saves any installed software patches on disks initialized with the SAVE\_CONFIGURATION command. To replace a controller and restore the configuration from a disk, you do not have to reinstall any software patches.

Configuration information cannot be retrieved from storagesets created on other HSx controllers (for example, HSD, HSJ, or HSZ controllers). You can only restore a configuration from a configuration saved on this or another HSG80 array controller.

# **Avoiding Problem Situations**

Under certain conditions, you may experience unusual array controller behavior. This section presents information to help you avoid such situations and to recover from them if they occur.

# Adding, Moving, and Changing Devices

The array controller maintains a configuration map of device types and locations. This map is used to communicate with devices. If you add, move, or change a device while the array controller is powered off without first changing the array controller configuration, the array controller is not able to communicate with the changed device when it returns to service.

If a device is removed by mistake while the array controller is off, delete all containers associated with the removed device after power was restored to the array controller.

If a device is replaced while the array controller is off, install the replacement device before restoring power to the array controller. Once power is restored, use the DELETE DISK CLI command to remove the disk from the configuration. Then use the ADD DISK CLI command to add the new device. This correctly removes the failed device and adds the new device after restoring power to the array controller.

See the *HSG80 Array Controller ACS Version 8.7 CLI Reference Guide* for details on CLI command usage and syntax.

See the *HSG80 Array Controller ACS Version 8.7 Maintenance and Service Guide* for correct device removal and addition procedures.

# **Moving Storagesets**

Move only *normal* storagesets. Do not move storagesets that are *reconstructing* or were *reduced*.



**CAUTION:** Ensure all storagesets are in *normal* mode prior to moving them, or data corruption occurs.

# Replacing Array Controllers, Cache Modules, or External Cache Battery Storage Building Blocks

You can replace the array controller, cache module, or external cache battery (ECB) storage building block (SBB) while the storage system is shut down. However, you must enter the SHUTDOWN THIS\_CONTROLLER command prior to shutting down the storage system in order to make configuration changes. If two array controllers are configured in a dual-redundant configuration, you must first enter the SHUTDOWN OTHER\_CONTROLLER command.

These commands instruct the array controllers to flush all unwritten data from the cache modules and discontinue all I/O activity. For more information regarding the SHUTDOWN controller command, see the *HSG80 Array Controller ACS Version 8.7 CLI Reference Guide*. For information on maintenance and replacement of the array controller, cache module, and external cache battery, see the *HSG80 Array Controller ACS Version 8.7 Maintenance and Service Guide*.

### **Unit Offsets**

Setting unit offsets requires a bus rescan using probe-luns or lmgr utilities for the newly set offsets to take effect.

### **Linux Server Workaround**

Before installing the Solution Software Kit, kernel sources and header files must be reinstalled or the kit will not install properly. To install the files, type the following commands:

```
rpm -e kernel-source-2.4.x
rpm -e kernel-headers-2.4.x
rpm -i kernel-source-2.4.x
rpm -i kernel-headers-2.4.x
```

**NOTE:** This procedure applies to all versions of Linux.

The following section lists host-specific operating notes.

# QLA2x00 Adapter Driver Package

The RPM, **qla2x00-6.0.2-5.Redhat-AS-2-1.i386.rpm**, contains the adapter driver that supports the HP Fibre Channel adapters on Red Hat Advanced Server 2.1. The RPM contains the driver source code, precompiled modules for the base kernel of Red Hat Advanced Server 2.1, and system startup scripts.

The driver revision in this RPM is 6.0.2. This procedure applies to ProLiant blade servers only.

#### Install and Uninstall

To install the qla2x00 RPM, follow the directions that are in the Rapid Deployment Pack User Guide for deploying RPMs to a ProLiant server. You can also copy the qla2x00.rpm file to your system by typing the command:

```
# rpm -i gla2x00-6.0.2-6.Redhat-AS-2-1.i386.rpm
```

To remove the qla2x00 package, type the command:

```
# rpm -e qla2x00
```

### Components of QLA2x00

#### **Driver Source Code**

The driver source code is located in the <code>/opt/hp/storage\_drivers/qla602/src</code> directory. You may need to compile new driver modules if you rebuild your kernel. It is recommended that you use the <code>hp\_fccfg.sh</code> script in the fibreutils RPM.

**NOTE:** You must have the kernel sources for the current kernel installed to proceed with the driver module recompilation.

However, if you want to rebuild the driver modules manually, perform the following steps:

- 1. Change the directory to /opt/hp/storage\_drivers/qla602/src
- 2. Remove any previously compiled drivers by typing the command: make -f makefile.nonsp clean
- 3. Compile the driver modules by typing the command:

```
make -f makefile.nonsp SMP=x
```

- where x=0 if you are using a uni-processor machine or x=1 if you are using an SMP machine.
- 4. Copy the qla2200.o and qla2300.o files to the /lib/modules/<kernel version>/kernel/drivers/scsi directory.
- 5. Reload the qla2200 and qla2300 modules or reboot your server.

### **Precompiled Driver Binaries**

Included in the RPM are precompiled qla2200 and qla2300 driver modules. The modules were compiled for the 2.4.9-e.3 kernel, which should be the base kernel with the Red Hat Advanced Server distribution. The RPM installer will attempt to load the precompiled modules when the RPM is installed. If the driver load fails for some reason, you can also recompile the driver modules for your environment by following the steps above.

### **System Startup Scripts**

Also included in the RPM are system startup scripts which are copied into the /etc/rc.d/init.d directory. There are also links created from the startup scripts to the /etc/rc.d/rcx.d directories. Links are created and driver modules are started when the system is processing the specific run-level startup directory.

### **Fibreutils Utilities**

The RPM, fibreutils-1.0.0-5.i386.rpm, contains assorted utilities that complement the qla2x00 driver package.

Fibreutils contains two major utilities:

- hp\_fccfg.sh
- probe-luns

The hp\_fccfg.sh script allows you to recompile the driver if needed and change the default queue depth for disk devices attached to a qla2200 series or qla2300 series fibre channel adapter. Probe-luns solves the problem of non-consecutive LUNs.

#### Install and Uninstall

To install the fibreutils RPM, follow the directions that are in the Rapid Deployment Pack User Guide for deploying RPMs to a ProLiant server. The fibreutils RPM can also be installed by copying the .rpm file to your system and typing the command:

```
# rpm -i fibreutils-1.0.0-5.i386.rpm
```

To remove the fibreutils package, type the command:

```
# rpm -e fibreutils
```

### Components of Fibreutils

Here is a more detailed description of each component.

### Hp\_fccfg.sh

The hp\_fccfg.sh script allows you to recompile the qla2200.0 and qla2300.0 modules, invoke the probe-luns script, and change the default queue depth of the disk devices attached to a qla2200 or qla23xx adapter. To use this script, you must have the qla2x00 driver RPM installed on your system, as well as the kernel sources.

1. Start the script by typing the command:

```
# hp_fccfg.sh
```

The Main Menu is displayed.

2. To recompile the driver, choose **Recompile QLA Driver**.

The Recompile and Reload QLA Driver Menu is displayed.

Menu options Compile SMP QLA Single Path Driver and Compile Non-SMP QLA Single Path Driver compile the qla2200.0 and qla2300.0 modules and place them in the correct directory to be used by insmod. Any change to driver module files, such as copying, are displayed in the /var/log/messages file.

- 3. Return to the Main Menu by choosing the **Back to Main Menu** option.
- 4. To invoke the different probe-luns options, choose **LUN Rescan Options** from the Main Menu.

The LUN Rescan Options Menu is displayed.

The most useful options are **Show Adapters in System** and **Probe for LUNs**.

- The **Show Adapters in System** option shows all SCSI subsystem adapters on your server.
- The **Probe for LUNs** option is the best option to scan for non-consecutive LUNs.
- 5. Choose the **Probe for IDs** option from the Main Menu to change the default queue depth of the qla2200 and qla2300 modules when the modules are loaded at boot time.

When you choose the **Probe for IDs** option, the current default queue depth is displayed.

6. Enter the new queue depth number when prompted for a response.

#### **Probe-LUNs**

The purpose of the probe-luns script is to configure non-consecutive LUNs that are seen through a gla2200 or gla23xx adapter.

**NOTE:** the probe-luns script does NOT do dynamic LUN discovery. The script should be invoked from the command-line as follows:

# probe-luns <options>

The two most useful options are:

- -a displays a list of available adapters to scan
- -1 scan adapters by LUNs

**NOTE:** This is the preferred method of scanning for non-consecutive LUNs.

The probe-luns script is run automatically at system startup through the use of startup scripts in /etc/init.d.

# Selective Storage Presentation (SSP) on SuSE SLES-7

A server reboot is required after using Selective Storage Presentation (SSP) to grant host access to a LUN.

# **Host Operating System Support of Multi-Bus Failover**

Although the array controller has the capability to support multi-bus failover, the Linux operating system does not currently support this feature.

### **Documentation Anomalies**

The following are known additions and corrections to the *HSG80 ACS Solution Software Version 8.7 Installation and Configuration Guide*.

- Under "What is the Command Console LUN?" on page 1-9, the last sentence of the first paragraph should read, "The HSG80 uses SCSI-3 with your platform."
- The "Minimum System Requirements" found on page 3-8 are incorrect. See "System Components", page 20, for corrected data.
